Advent 2007

Father Walt's "In the Wilderness Musings"



HAPPY NEW YEAR! This greeting might seem to be a bit premature, and in the secular calendar it would be. In the church calendar, however, it's right on the mark, for the First Sunday of Advent (December 2nd this year) is the church's "New Year's Day", beginning a new liturgical year. The Church Year traces the life of Christ, and as a worshiping community, we get to experience the life of Christ vicariously as we re-present the Sacred Story in song, and readings; in symbols, in colors, and in liturgical drama.

The Season of Advent begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day. And ends the day before Christmas. The liturgical color may be either violet (the color of penitence, and of preparation for a major feast) or blue (recently adopted by many churches to make clear that Advent is not, like Lent, a penitential season).

The primary symbol of Advent is the "Advent Wreath". A large one containing three violet and one rose candle, or four blue candles, is placed in the Sanctuary of the Church, and a smaller one families are encouraged to place on their dinner tables during Advent. One candle is lit on the first Sunday in Advent, saying the collect for that Sunday; two on the second; three on the third, etc. each with the collect for that Sunday.

The word "Advent" literally means a "coming" or an "arrival". In this season we talk about the three comings of Christ: his first coming to the manger in Bethlehem at Christmas; his present coming into our lives through our reception of His spiritual Body and Blood in Holy Communion; and his Presence in prayer and meditation, and the reading of His Word; and His future coming at the End of Time to "judge both the living and the dead." (So in a sense Advent is both the beginning and the end of the story.)

The major figure of the Advent Season is John the Baptist, our patron saint, as he foretells the Savior's birth at Christmas, but also calls for repentance and preparation and speaks eloquently about the last Judgement.

The hymns during Advent reflect the major themes of the season: John the Baptist's call for preparation and repentance (e.g. "On Jordan's bank the Baptist's cry, announces that the Lord is nigh...") and the second coming of Christ (e.g. "Lo, He comes with clouds descending...")

Other things that will be different in our worship beginning Advent 1 2007, will be that we will move from Cycle C to Cycle A in our three year Eucharistic Lectionary(i.e. the set reading for each Sunday) The Gospel readings in year A come mostly from Matthew; year B from Mark; and year C from Luke. Readings from Johns's Gospel are interspersed throughout the three years. The three year cycle insures that preachers don't have to preach on the same readings year after year after year, and congregations don't have to listen to the same readings and preaching as well.

The next thing that will be different beginning Advent 1 2007 is that by vote of our Church's General Convention, we will no longer be using the Lectionary found at the back of our Prayer Book (which was peculiar to Anglicans amongst churches using fixed lectionaries) but will be utilizing the "Revised Common Lectionary", which is the one used by Roman Catholics and most mainline Protestant Churches. My wife and I have given the new RCL Lectern book of Readings and the new RCL Book of the Gospels, for our use in Eucharistic Celebrations. The Sunday Service Leaflets' Lectionary inserts which the congregation will be utilizing will also be according to the Revised Common Lectionary.

Other small changes in our Sunday Eucharistic liturgies in Advent will be the substitution of the Kyrie for the Gloria; the use of Eucharistic Prayer "A" (rather then "B" that we used on Sundays after Pentecost), and new musical settings for the Sanctus and Agnus Dei.

Advent is a season of hope; of joyful anticipation; of repentance and new beginnings' of preparation for the celebration of the Savior's birth in Bethlehem; and for his Birth in our hearts and lives today believing, in the words of the beloved Christmas Carol: "where meek hearts will receive Him, still the dear Christ enters in.") So I guess I'll be closing with a reversal of the usual greeting, and wish you all a "Happy New Year and a Merry Christmas." IN future editions of The Messenger, I will continue my 'musings' about other Seasons of the Church year. Stay tuned"
